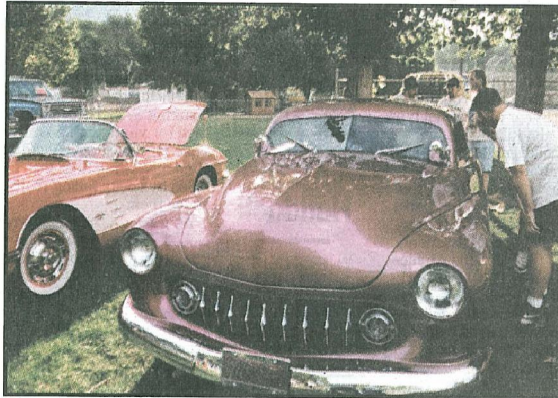
AUTOMANIA 2007 — Chris Brightenburg's companies Parts Unlimited and LikWid Art are sponsoring the second consecutive Pleasant Grove Automania for Pleasant Grove's Strawberry Days at Wil's Park east of the city rodeo grounds Saturday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. "Plan B," performers from the UVSC, Auto Expo will be entertaining and spectators are free.

Pleasant Grove Automania began in 1991 and ended for a 4-year hiatus in 2000. Committee members organizing the show are Dave and Connie Williamson and Chris and Cindy Brightenburg. DirtHeadz club members are volunteering to help with parking.

RESPONSE VEHICLE LEADS PARADE — A new star of the Strawberry Days Parade, the PowerHawk will be one of the lead vehicles featured with Pleasant Grove's police cars.

CERT COURSE OFFERED — The Pleasant Grove Fire Department will be sponsoring a Community Emergency Response Team training course July 11-14. Hours will be Wednesday-Friday from 6-10 p.m. and Saturday, 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Disaster preparedness, disaster fire suppression, disaster medical operations I and II, light search and rescue, disaster psychology and team organization and a disaster training exercise will be taught during the course. Participants must attend all four classes and complete all seven modules to complete the C.E.R.T. certification. Registration deadline for this session

is July 3 and there is a registration fee of \$35. Participants must register at the Pleasant Grove Police Department, Mon.-Fri. from 9 a.m.-5 p.m. Reading materials should be read prior to first class.

For C.E.R.T. team members, there will be a refresher course, dealing with lifts and carries and natural gas safety, on Aug. 28 from 7-9 p.m. Pre-registration is required at the police station, 87 E. 100 South, or by calling 785-3506 one week prior to the training date.

JULY 4TH CONCERT — The local band "The Seventh String" will be performing at Battle Creek Park in Pleasant Grove on July 4 from 7-9 p.m. The concert is free and will feature local musicians as well as some guest musicians. The band will play a variety of music including rock, pop, country, bluegrass, music from the '60s, '70s, '80s, '90s and today.

ANTIQUe ORGAN DONATED TO HISTORIC COMMISSION — An antique pump organ that used to sit in the "Old Third Ward Church" in Pleasant Grove has been donated to the Pleasant Grove Historic Commission. The organ, a Newman Brothers one manual, ten-stop, reed type organ was manufactured between 1910-1920.

"The leadership of the Timpanogos Stake wanted the organ to be preserved in the city and made available for all

current and future citizens," according to historic commission member Les Nielsen. The organ's new home is at the Pioneer Museum at 55 S. 100 East and is available for viewing.

CHADDER'S SUED — In-N-Out Burger, based in California, is suing Chadder's in American Fork for infringing on company trademarks, from the menu to the way food is packaged. Some say Chadder's is a dead ringer for the Irvine, Calif.-based fast-food chain.

In-N-Out filed a trademark infringement lawsuit last week against Chadder's and its owner, Chad Stubbs, in U.S. District Court in Salt Lake City. A hearing on the matter is scheduled Monday.
